The ODUNDE Festival is more than 15 blocks of vendors, displays, international cuisine, drumming and entertainment starting at 21st & South st. and ending at Bainbridge st & Grays Ferry.'

"We are so thrilled to be able to invite ODUNDE attendees back on South Street year after year, to hear the drumming, to watch families of different generations join us for fun and entertainment and to offer all the tastes of Africa, the Caribbean and African American culture through our diverse food offerings", said Oshunbumi Fernandez-West, CEO of ODUNDE. "The Festival continues to grow every year and we will have a week of celebrations starting on June 5 culminating in the actual festival on June 11. The festival has a \$30 million economic impact on the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and a \$28 million economic impact on the Philadelphia region every year. On Sunday, June 11, ODUNDE—meaning "Happy New Year" in Yoruba—begins at noon with the historic procession to the Schuylkill River at South Street bridge in keeping with the West African based origins of the festival, rooted in the Yoruba spiritual tradition. For this ceremony, gifts of fruit and flowers are brought to honor the Goddess Oshun-the diety of culture, civilization, art and love. The festival transforms South Street into the largest African American street festival in the United States. Displays of African art and artifacts, including masks, sculpture and clothing define the festival's distinct international flavor. As always, one of the highlights of the celebration is the endless variety of food offerings from throughout the African diaspora. The festival also features two stages of entertainment and activities for attendees—The Queen Lois stage at 23rd and South Street and the Queen Bumi stage at Grays Ferry. The entertainment on both stages will start at 1:30 p.m.

The featured entertainer this year will be Grammy Award winning singer, songwriter and actress Chrisette Michele. She will perform on the Queen Lois stage starting at approximately 7 p.m.

Michele has made a groove in the music industry that spans from 2007 to the present. Her passion to help others and philanthropic efforts include support and volunteerism with organizations such as UNICEF, Girls Inc., VH1's Save the Music, Amnesty, and many other charity organizations. Michele has visited Iraq, Kuwait, and many other countries to support American Troops in an effort to uplift, motivate and encourage them while they are away from their families protecting the U.S.

She has a heart for encouraging the broken, the hard-working, and those in great service positions. She has a passion for cultivating safe spaces within her community and provides a cross-cultural understanding of self-worth and self-care. In 2020, Michele created her own safe space called "The Inner Peace Academy." The Academy is a space where men and women can gather to explore purpose.

The festival takes place on the Second Sunday in June along South Street from 20th to 24th Streets and in the surrounding area. The free, outdoor festival, whose central ceremonies are rooted in the traditions of the Yoruba people of Nigeria, features a wide variety of vendors, craftspeople, artists and performers. Each year, the ODUNDE Festival draws hundreds of thousands of people from throughout the Philadelphia area, the Mid-Atlantic region, and across the world. With a \$30 million economic impact on State of Pennsylvania and a \$28 million economic impact on the City of Philadelphia, the ODUNDE Festival has been designated an official City event.

Created in 1975 by the late Lois Fernandez, the ODUNDE Festival is the largest African American street festival in America. The institution continues as Bumi Fernandez-West carries on her mother's legacy through ODUNDE 365, the non-profit that produces the festival. The organization has also spawned ODUNDE365 which provides year-round cultural programs to Philadelphia schools, businesses and organizations.
